**Instructions for Authors**

**I.** Submitted articles must conform to the academic criteria. The articles are judged by the Scientific Committee of the magazine. Authors should declare in writing that the article has not been submitted simultaneously to another journal. In the opposite case is not accepted. Also, they must declare at the same time that the article has not been published in the past. If it is published then it is hosted in the Annex Deltoi.

**II.** The number of the allowable words in the body text can be between two and a half thousand (2,500) and nine thousand (9,000) words. For photos and other visual material it must be clarified by a letter that they are not bounded by commercial rights or, when this happens, that the author has them.

**III.** The articles are written in Greek, French, German, Spanish, Italian, English and Russian. Both the polytonic and the monotonic system of Greek are acceptable.

**IV.** Articles are written in Times New Roman size twelve (12) with a half line spacing (1.5). The text must have full alignment. In the opposite case is not accepted. The page numbering is continuous and bottom right.

**V.** The articles are sent simultaneously as doc and pdf file.

**VI.** The headline contains the title of the article, the author's name, the institution in which the author participates, and the e-mail address. The headline in Greek is first. The summary follows in Greek and English. The extent of the summary is around five hundred (500) words. Then the keywords follow. First are those in Greek. After that the body text follows. After the body of the



text, the bibliography follows. The article may be accompanied by annexes, placed after the bibliography, as with visual material list, placed after the annexes. For articles in Greek or languages retain their grammatical cases, the author's data are as follows:

**VII.** The articles are accompanied by an attachment with short curriculum vitae of the author, till two hundred (200) words, which contains and the address, the telephone number, and the Skype address. These data are not announced, but remain accessible only to the magazine's director.

**VIII. Guide for the bibliography, the references and the footnotes:**

**A.** Words or phrases in ancient Greek, Latin, or in a language other than the language of the text must be written in *italics*. When the author gives emphasis on words or sentences can use expanded character spacing.

**B.** References can be listed either inside the text or at the bottom of each page. When they are listed inside the text then they are enclosed in square brackets, containing the author's surname, year of publication, number of pages / images / shapes. References with more than three names can be listed with the first name of the first author, followed by etc. Example: [Dobbs, 1983, 13-15], [Freeth etc., 2006, 320].

**C.** The abridgements are included either in double quotes form ("..."), if it is in English, French, German, Spanish, Italian or Russian or in the form of double quotes («...»), if it is in Greek.

**D.** When the references are given as footnotes then they are written in Times New Roman ten (10) and line spacing (1.25) while they are numbered consecutively. For sources and studies often cited, after the first report, other reports can contain the author's surname, followed by op. cit. and the number of pages. If the title of the project is mentioned in the preceding footnote then is listed The same followed by the number of pages.

**E.** The bibliography contains separately primary and secondary sources. If the Greek titles are listed along with English, the authors are classified according to the Latin alphabet, due to the author's surname. If the project has been issued to different publishers, publishers are given, separated by a dash (-). If the project has been reissued, the first year of edition is given in



parentheses, and then following the year of re-edition. For reports to be published, or without edition date, are used the (under publication) and (undated).

## IX. Guide for the bibliography:

### Book in printed form:

Form: Surname, name of the author. *Title (and subtitle) of the book*, Version number after the first. Edition city: Publisher, Year.

Example: Dobbs, B., J., T., *The Foundations of Newton's Alchemy, or, "The Hunting of the Greene Lyon"*, 3<sup>rd</sup> edition, Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 1983.

Quote in the text: [Dobbs, 1983, 13-15].

### Book in digital form:

Form: Surname and name of author, *Title (and subtitle) of the book*, Edition city: Publisher, Year. Web Site (Data retrieval date).

Example: Manning, J., G. *The last pharaohs: Egypt under the Ptolemies, 305-30 BC*. New York: , 2010. <https://www.amazon.com/Last-Pharaohs-Egypt-Ptolemies-305-30-book/dp/B0090EMOKQ/163-8774688-9951544?ie=UTF8&tag=princetonuniv-20> (Data retrieval date: 15th September 2016).

### Book with more than two authors:

Form: Surname, name of the first author, name and Surname of the second author,... *Title (and subtitle) of the book*. Edition city: Publisher, Year.

Example: Misner, C. W., K. S Thorne και J. A. Wheeler, *Gravitation*, New York: W.H. Freeman and Company, 1973.

For more than three authors, is given the surname of the first author followed by etc.

### Article from a magazine in printed form:

Form: Surname, name of the author. "Title (and subtitle) of the Article.", *Magazine's title*, Volume, Issue (Publication Year): Number of pages.

#### Examples:

Freeth, T., Y. Bitsakis, X. Moussas, J. Seiradakis, A. Tselikas, H. Mangou, M. Zafeiropoulou, R. Hadland, D. Bate, A. Ramsey, «Decoding the ancient Greek astronomical calculator known as the Antikythera Mechanism», *Nature*, 11, 444 (2006), 587-591.

Wright, M. T., «The Antikythera Mechanism and the Early History of the Moon Phase display», *Antiquarian Horology* 15 (2006), 319-329.



**Magazine's article drawn from the web:**

Form: Surname and name of the author. "Title (and subtitle) of the Article." *Magazine's title*, Volume, Issue (Edition Year): Number of pages. Web Site (Data retrieval date:)

Example: Hall, C. S., «Inference Instruction for Struggling Readers: a Synthesis of Intervention Research», *Educational Psychology Review*, 28, 1, (2016), 1-22, <http://link.springer.com/article/10.1007/s10648-014-9295-x>. (Data retrieval date: 15 September 2016).

**Doctoral thesis or Master thesis:**

Form: Surname and name of the author. "Title (and subtitle) of the project.", Doctoral thesis or Master thesis, Department, University, City, Year.

Example: Anastassiou, Marios. *The Antikythera Mechanism: Astronomy and Technology in Ancient Greece*, Doctoral thesis, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, 2014.

**Multi- volume project:**

Surname and name of the author / Editor, *Title*, volume Number, edition City, Publisher, Publication year.

Example: Dr. Frisch, C., (Ed.), *Joannis Kepleri Astronomi Opera Omnia*, (Vol. 1-9), Frankfurt et Erlange: Heyder & Zimmer, 1858–1871.

**Lemma of a printed encyclopedia:**

Form: Surname and name of the author. "Title (and subtitle) of Lemma." At: Surname, First name writers / editors. *Encyclopaedia Title*. Volume Number, City, Publisher, Year.

**Web Site with reference to its author:**

Surname and name of author (Year, Month, Day of the edition). "Article Title.", Web Site (Data retrieval date).

Example: O'Connor, J. J., & Robertson, E. F., (1999, January), «Euclid of Alexandria», Retrieved from: <http://www-history.mcs.st-and.ac.uk/Biographies/Euclid.html>. (Data retrieval date: 16 September 2016).

**Photograph:**

Form: Surname and name of the photographer (photographer), *Photo Title*, City: Publisher / Museum, Year, Month, Edition Date.

**Image taken from data base.**

Form: Surname and name of photographer (photographer), *Photo Title*, City: Publisher / Museum, Year, Month, Edition Day, Web Site (Data retrieval date).

**Lectures and presentations drawn from the internet.**



Form: Surname and of the author, *Name or title of the lecture*, [file type], Year of publishing, Web Site (Data retrieval date).

Examples: Yablo, S., *24.221 Metaphysics, Fall 2015* [OCW-IMSCP zip archive], (Massachusetts Institute of Technology: MIT OpenCourseWare), <http://ocw.mit.edu> (Accessed). License: Creative Commons BY-NC-SA, 2015, Retrieved from: <http://dspace.mit.edu/handle/1721.1/98368#files-area>. (Data retrieval date: 16 September 2016).

**Printed article of a popular magazine:**

Surname and name of the author, "Article's Title", *Magazine's Title*, Volume, Issue, Date, Number of Pages.

**Newspaper's article**

Form: Surname and author's name, "Article's Title", *Newspaper's Title*, Date, newspaper's section, Number of pages.

**Twin Reports:**

In the case of twin reports, lowercase letters are used after the publishing year (2011a, 2011b, etc.). The reports are sorted by the alphabetical order of the title. If the reports are different in the order of the names or the names themselves, then the reports are distinguished with the necessary presentation of the names. Examples: [Field, & Wright, 1985a], [Field, & Wright, 1985b], [Marewski, Gaissmaier, & Gigerenzer, 2010], [Marewski, Gaissmaier, Schooler, Goldstein, & Gigerenzer, 2010]. The references are given as: [Marewski, Gaissmaier, & Gigerenzer, 2010], [Marewski, Gaissmaier, Schooler, and collaborators, 2010].
